With over 45 countries and territories involved across all five continents, three decades of claims, struggles, hopes and disillusion and over half a billion people still bearing this legacy today, French decolonization is one of the major shocks of the 20th century. However this key historical episode remains largely unknown and confrontational, burdened by the weight of prejudices, violence, crime, guilt and nostalgia. Through the voice of the last witnesses having experienced the events firsthand, but also through the testimony of their descendants who today are the bearers of this memory, our account will focus on the human dimension to offer for the first time a global synthesis of a shared heritage which still remains sensitive.

As a director specialized in history and specifically 100% recolored historical footage, David Korn-Brzoza has written and directed numerous landmark documentaries on the major conflicts of the 20th century, on the history of the Third Reich, and on espionage. In 2002, he wins the Gold Plaque at the Chicago International Film Festival for *Echelon: The Secret Power*. In 2004, he also receives an award for Best Scientific Film at the Teleciencia Festival and a World Gold Medal at the New York Film Festival for *Superbat*. Most of his films have been aired in primetime and have received a huge success in terms of both critical acclaim and attendance. Since 2015, *After Hitler* and *Hitler's Last Year* count among the films that totaled the largest audiences of National Geographic.



# RWANDA, A LEGACY OF GENOCIDE

With rare sincerity, this documentary reveals remarkable points of view, those of a country's youth trying to rise from the ashes of a genocidal past.

Through her attempts to persuade both close friends and complete strangers to vote for her, her campaign reveals the many faces of a country seeking to forge a new identity. In its own unique way, this documentary sheds light on women's place in Tunisia's changing society.

# IRAQ'S LOST GENERATION

There are believed to be some one hundred thousand children that have been fending for themselves since the battle against ISIS. From orphans in the streets of Mosul to "the children of ISIS," whose families had pledged allegiance to the caliphate. Since their existence is not legally recognized, they have no I.D., and therefore no access to education, medical care, or food assistance. Since the fall of ISIS, tens of thousands of children have also been held in camps along with the most radicalized of the women. They are living in catastrophic sanitary and humanitarian conditions that have only worsened with the Covid-19 crisis. An unprecedented investigation into a generation of young victims of the war against the Islamic State. How can we help them to believe in the future and to find a place in society, so that they do not become a threat to the international community?

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**ANNE POIRET** is a filmmaker and investigative broadcast journalist based in Paris. She won the most prestigious journalism award in France in 2007 – the Albert Londres Prize for her film shot in Sri Lanka *Muttur: a Crime Against Humanitarians*. Anne has often filmed the traumas of the "neither peace, nor war" situations in the Middle East, Cambodia, Africa... Her recent filmography includes: *State-Builders* on the UN in South Sudan, *The Envoy, inside Syria Peace Negotiations* that focuses on the work of Staffan de Mistura, the UN Special Envoy for Syria or *My country makes weapons* on the French weapons industry. *The Genocide of the II Reich* on the forgotten genocide in Namibia and *Welcome to Refugeestan* on UNHCR and refugee camps all over the world - were selected in a dozen European documentary festivals. Her latest film *Mosul after the war* was broadcast in France, Germany, Sweden and Switzerland last spring.

A unique art-history saga, this film recounts the troubling story of the African artwork that fills European museums, and whose return is now being demanded by their countries of origin. Snatched up like trophies by colonizers, the works fertilized European art before acquiring recognition as universal masterpieces in their own right. But in Africa, their absence is still traumatic. Through the burning question of their possible restitution, the film invites us to reconsider both our cultural heritage and museums' role in reinventing our relationship with Africa.

A filmmaker and screenplay-writer having trained as an art historian, Nora Philippe regularly programs French film cycles for Columbia University, including "Blackness in French Film" in 2018, in line with her research into representations of black people. She is an associate member of the Paris-Descartes University's national-research agency research project into restitution, « ReTours, géopolitiques du patrimoine, économies du retour, imaginaires du tourisme » ("ReTurns, the geopolitics of cultural heritage, the economics of restitution, and touristic imagination.")



# TOULOUSE- LAUTREC, THE BALLET

Composed around the life and work of the painter Henri de Toulouse-Lautrec, the ballet takes us straight to the heart of Belle Époque in Paris: the cabarets, the balls at the Moulin Rouge, the parties and pleasure palaces. The painter's life provides the framework for the ballet: the story of a short man who rose above his physical handicap by throwing himself body and soul into art, pleasure and an unrestrained and profligate social life, until his death from disease at age 36.

# FURCY, FIGHTING FOR FREEDOM

For over 25 years, from 1817 to 1843, Furcy, who was officially considered a slave on Bourbon Island (the former name of Reunion Island), fought to get the highest court in the Kingdom of France to recognize his status as a free man. The most amazing part of the story is that he won. There is no other known case anywhere in the world in which an enslaved person sued his master in order to regain his freedom. Just a few years after the verdict was returned at the Royal Court of Paris recognizing Furcy's freedom, slavery was abolished in all French colonies. How is it possible that Furcy won? What kind of man was he? What does his story have to tell us two centuries later? The documentary will explore the life of this exceptional man.
